





# Joining government boards when you have a criminal record

### What is a criminal record?

Victoria Police keeps a record of any crimes you have been found guilty of, and any ongoing investigations against you by the police. They can also check records kept by other states and territories.

### What is a government board or committee?

In Victoria there are many types of government boards and committees. These include groups that:

- run government services such as hospitals
- advise government on policy issues
- play a role in holding public officials to account or managing public land.

## Will they ask about my criminal record?

Yes. If you would like to join a government board, you will be asked:

- if you have ever been found guilty of a crime.
- if you are currently being taken to court, or if you expect to be taken to court in the next year.

The department that manages the board will also do a police check.

# Will having a criminal record stop me from joining a government board or committee?

There is no law to stop you from becoming a member of a government board or committee if you have a criminal record.

The government department that manages the board will take your criminal record into account when they decide if they will appoint you or not.

## Are Koori Court Elders and Respected Persons board members?

No. They are employed by Court Services Victoria as casual employees.
